First up – Airbus:

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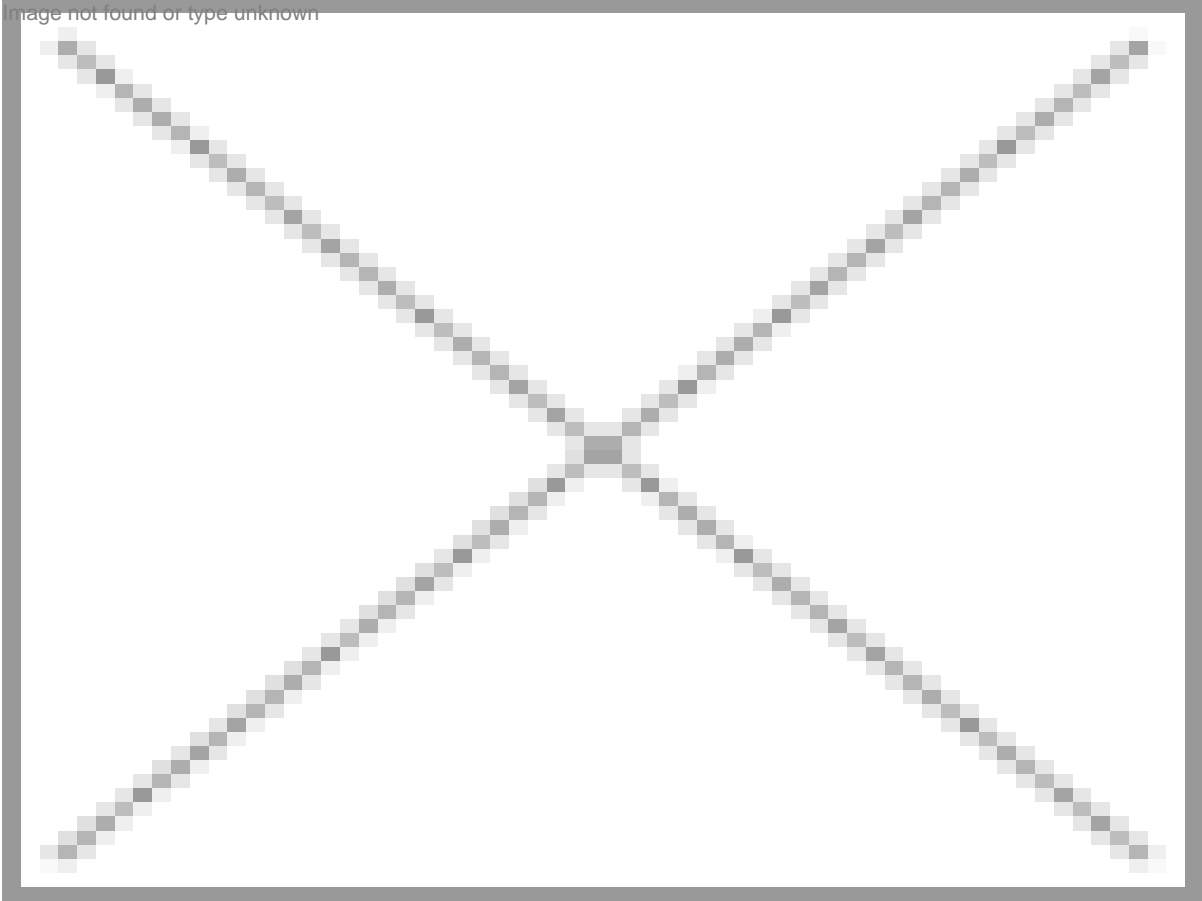
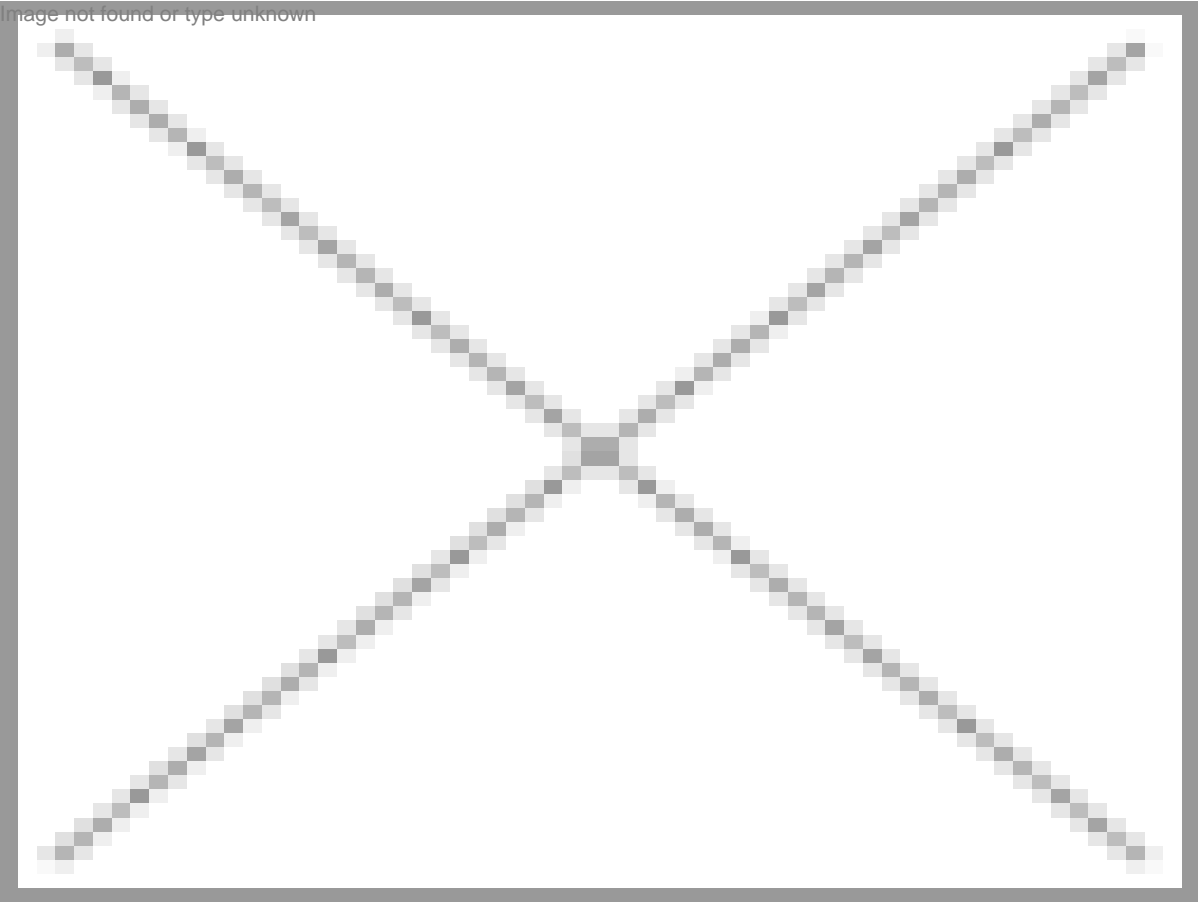


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Airbus Pivot-Bin mocked up against an A320 fuselage – images, Economy Class and Beyond.

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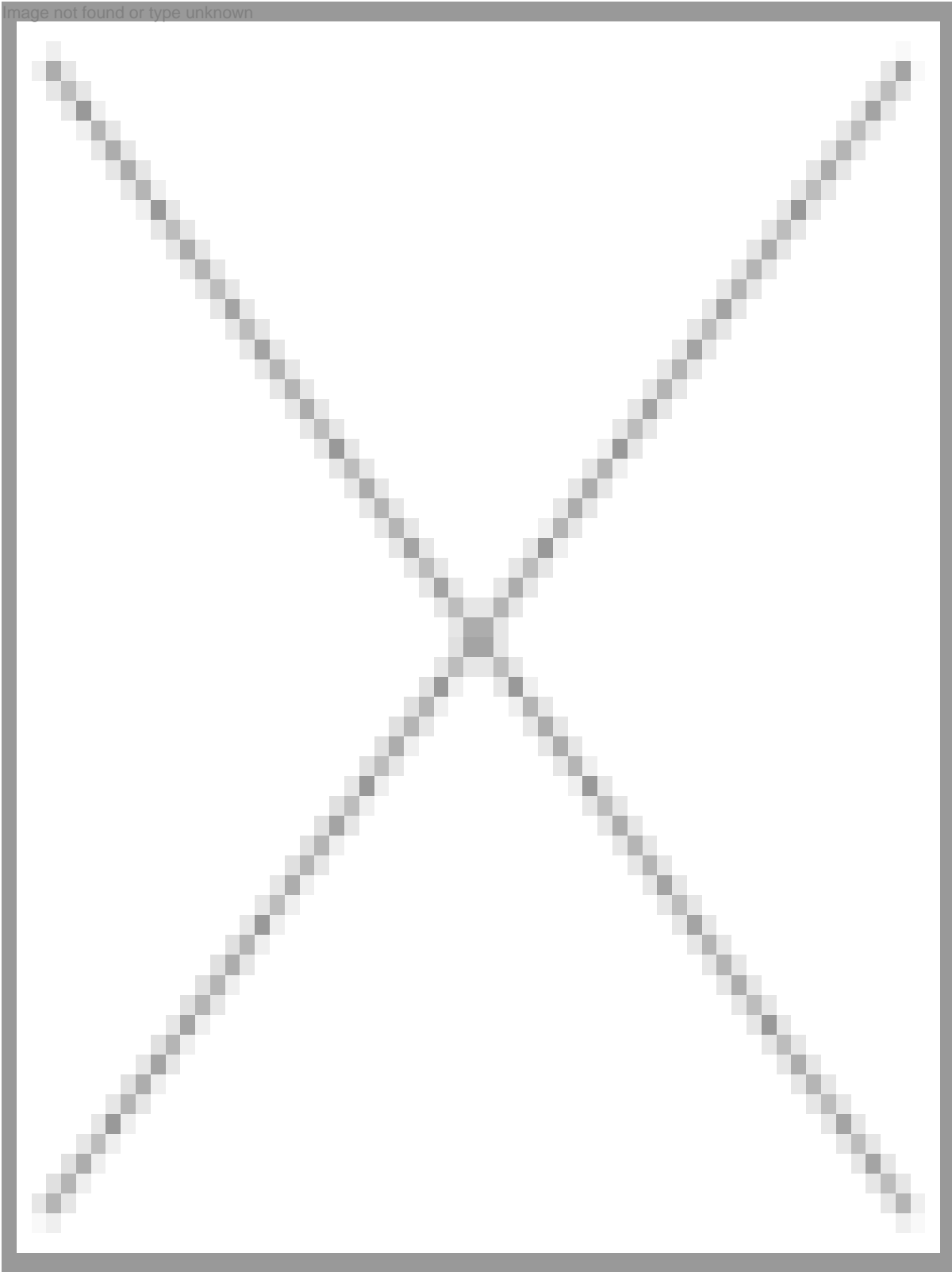


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Boeing Space Bin mocked up against a 737 fuselage – Images, Economy Class and Beyond

The Airbus pivot bin is flying aboard Delta Airlines, whilst the Boeing space bin is being launched by Alaska Airline.

And hopefully – more airlines will choose these overhead bins.

There are good reasons to – it will cut the request for gate checking of luggage (costing time and

resources on the ground), and hopefully speed up passenger throughput as they board the plane.

For passengers there will be one important different – and that’s how they stow their cases – which will now need to be placed in sideways.

However, whilst these bins are one hell of the step in the right direction, there is a downside.

So far, all the overhead bins have been shown with the same sized luggage, and it being within dimensions.
